J.M.W. Turner Key Facts

Life	Joseph Mallard William Turner born in 1775 and died in 1857
Country of Birth	Covent Garden, London, England
Style	<u>Watercolour</u> landscapes/seascapes
Media	Paint - <u>watercolour</u>



Joseph Mallard William Turner

JMW Turner attended the Royal Academy of Arts school in 1789 and was accepted into the academy the following year. Joseph Turner began sketching outside, using these as a basis for his paintings, indoors. He liked to paint 'en plein air' – out in the open. He became known as "The Painter of Light". He travelled to Belgium and Holland to see the sight of the Battle of Trafalgar after receiving a royal commission to paint the battle. A marble statue, sculpted by Patrick MacDowell, was created in 1862, which now stands in the nave of St Paul's Cathedral
