recipe: a set of instructions for preparing a particular dish.
dough: a thick mixture of flour and liquid.
knead: work into dough with your hands.
prove: allowing dough to rise.
combine: to mix.

Recipe for Traditional White Bread (750g)

Instructions

1. Pour the water and salt into the bread pan and add chopped butter. Combine flour with sugar and skimmed milk powder and add to the bread pan. Make a small pocket in the top and fill it with the yeast. Wipe any spills from the outside of the pan.
2. Place the bread pan into the breadmaker, lower the bread pan handle and close the lid.
3. Press the Menu button to programme (1) Basic.
4. Select Size, Crust Colour and press 'Start'. Bread will be baked in the number of hours indicated.



Ingredients

- 315ml water
- 1½ teaspoons table salt
- 30g chopped butter
- 600g strong white bread flour
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon skimmed milk powder
- 1½ teaspoons dried sachet yeast

adding realistic features	finishing touches could be tiles, wooden timber strips on the outside, white to show the wattle and daub walls
attaching	joining to parts of your model together such as with glue or tape
Christopher Wren	famous designer of new houses in London after the great fire of London. he worked for the king. build St Pauls cathedral.
cutting	carefully cutting out windows and a space for the door using scissors.
fold along crease lines	a fold line made in paper.
hinge	a movable joint or mechanism on which a door, swings as it opens and closes or which connects linked objects.
leaded windows	leaded windows are decorative windows made of small sections of glass supported strips of lead.
London	the capital city of the UK where the great fire of London occurred in 1666.
roof	the structure on the top of a house.
roof support	making a frame or support beam that can hold the roof in position
stone chimney	a structure that comes out the roof of the building
tiled roof	the top of the building is covered with small brick tiles
Tudor	17 th century period of time
wattle and daub walls	a material formerly or traditionally used in building walls, consisting of a network of interwoven sticks and twigs covered with mud or clay.
wooden shutters and door	doors which are positioned on the outside wall of a house either side of a window which open and close over the window.
