### What are positions and directions?

You can use **position** words to describe where something or someone is.

For example, you can use words such as, 'above', 'below', 'near', 'far', 'up' or 'down'.

You can use **directions** and **turns** to describe how to move from one place to another place.

For example, you can use words such as, 'forwards', 'backwards', 'half turn' and 'quarter turn'.

### What is a preposition?

Prepositions are words that show the relationship between a noun and something else in a sentence.

Words like 'on', 'under' and 'inside', as well as phrases like 'next to', 'in front of', and 'on top of' are all prepositions.

Prepositions often tell you **where** or **when** something is by showing direction, location, or time such as:

The fish swam through the tunnel.
